Julie Logue is a volunteer for Underground Pet Rescue, an all breed companion animal rescue based in Madison and serving all of Dane County. Julie's mission, as well as that of Underground, is to find permanent homes for animals in need and to enrich lives by strengthening the connection between animals and people through community services and outreach. They are a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization.

Julie opens her home to foster dogs and has fostered 65 dogs over the past two years. My sister adopted a dog who was fostered by Julie and witnessed firsthand her most amazing dedication to animals. Julie recently accepted a dog (Hannah) from Alabama who was expecting a litter of

puppies. Hannah's history included abuse and she has scars from her trauma. Julie assisted Hannah with the birth of 9 puppies and is currently feeding the puppies around the clock due to Hannah becoming ill.

While Underground provides veterinarian services to the foster dogs, the foster volunteers are responsible for providing food, supplies and a safe, nurturing environment for the animals in their care. Julie funds the fostering expenses by working full-time from home and supplements her income with a part-time job.

Julie's mission is to "save lives." The gift card came at an especially difficult and important time with the many expenses related to the care of Hannah and her brood. She wishes to express her gratitude for the S.P.A.R.K.



Many of those people had to spend all they had and max out credit cards despite having flood insurance.

> The flood brought you grief, it's true, But know our community is here for you. Though your home was damaged and belongings gone, We hope and pray your spirit stays strong.


On Christmas Eve we drove to two of the houses that were severely damaged. Our kids dropped the cards on each of the front porches.

One house belonged to an older couple who were without power, heat and water for quite a while and who had to completely rebuild their foundation walls. The wife had moved out for several weeks while the husband stayed, as he just didn't want to leave the familiarity of home. We ran into them while on a walk several months before Christmas and talked for quite a while. They had used all their savings and were feeling overwhelmed by the financial burden.

The other house where we dropped a card off was still not safe to live in, although the owners had decorated for Christmas and there were lights strung and a large lit up Santa figure in the window. On the front porch door there was a sign that said "Hope".

We are grateful for the opportunity to be a part of the S.P.A.R.K. Society and hopefully start a spark of kindness that will remind others that they are cared about, that there is good in the world, and that they can pass that spark onto others.

Now this alone may not make Dee unique, there are many survivors who work everyday of the week to provide for their families.

What does make Dee unique and deserving of this gift, is her incredible giving nature. Last month when everyone is even busier getting things ready for the holidays Dee took on yet another task. Dee works at our Church, which was going to be hosting a community holiday meal. The immediate community of our Church tends to be single parent homes and those who are under or unemployed. A call came into the Church asking if the Church could provide Christmas

gifts for the children who would be attending the meal. Now the Church did not have the resources to provide gifts. Dee could not tolerate the idea of these children not receiving gifts, so she took this task on herself Dee solicited local businesses for contributions. She then shopped for gifts, wrapped the gifts for 60 children! This was on top of working her 3 jobs and caring for her family. Personally, I would find this a daunting task if I had a year to do it. Dee did this within 10 days of the community meal.

So, our S.P.A.R.K. cards were more of a thank you to Dee for all she does and hopefully provided her a moment to catch her breath for a minute.

SOAR Case Management Services is a non-profit organization that has been providing services to people who have serious and mental illness since its inception in 1997. 

This fall Arleena's family lived in a camper until November when they were able to move into a rental house. Now they pay rent along with continuing to pay their monthly mortgage on the house they can't live in.

Arleena left a lasting impression on me. She was a beautiful young mother, who was in a really tough situation but stayed so positive. I left that meeting wondering how I would have responded to this situation and wanting to do more to help Arleena.




"Once Upon A Time...3"

The S.P.A.R.K. gift was donated to Jewish Social Services with the specific request that it be used for refugee housing.


Please keep in mind that affordable housing is in great need in the area. With a stable home comes a stable family and community.
